TOUR REPORT HAMPSHIRE & DORSET 3RD – 7TH AUGUST 2021

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TUESDAY 3RD AUGUST – *Calm with sunny spells, 20C*

Arriving in the New Forest town of Lyndhurst for our second wildlife tour of summer, we enjoyed a good meal at one of our favourite local pubs before wandering out onto the heath to see if the pair of **Nightjars** that had entertained us a few weeks ago would still be in residence. We didn't hear any churring at all, just a few distant 'coo-ick!' flight calls, and didn't manage a sighting on this occasion.

WEDNESDAY 4TH AUGUST – Warm and sunny, clouding over later, 22C

Today was a butterfly quest as we had an excellent warm day forecast, prior to three very dodgy looking days with rain and strong winds! We had therefore decided to try and pack as many key butterflies in as possible today and things went pretty well to plan. First off we made the 90 minute trip down to Dorset's Jurassic coast and the popular Lulworth Cove, to look for it's namesake skipper. We knew we would have to get here before the crowds got too ridiculous and already the car park was filling fast as we arrived. It was warm too, and our first explorations of the lower slopes of the chalk escarpment yielded a plethora of butterflies – **Lulworth Skipper** was easy to find, and we saw dozens in the taller grass areas particularly around clumps of bushes. **Small Copper**, **Marbled White**, **Brown Argus**, Common Blue and **Dark Green Fritillary** were other common species here, but we also saw several **Wall Brown** and at least a dozen **Clouded Yellows**. Our search for Adonis Blue, which we have seen here previously, was unfruitful. Stonechat, Yellowhammer, **Wheatear** and **Raven** were among the birds noted.

Leaving the now very busy cove behind us, we journeyed north for 45 minutes to the Butterfly Conservation reserve at Alner's Gorse. Lunch was enjoyed in the company of two **Purple Hairstreaks** at eye level by the car park, including a female laying eggs. Our main target for this site though would be the exquisite **Brown Hairstreak**, and heading straight down the track we soon came across a couple photographing one on low bramble blossom. We had some superb views, including the

seldom seen upperwing, before it flitted away. Continuing around the site we saw huge numbers of common species such as Meadow Brown, Gatekeeper, Large White, Small White, Peacock, Brimstone and Small Skipper. On one low tree we saw many **Purple Hairstreaks**, including four together on one flower head! Another **Brown Hairstreak** also obliged in the same tree, at one point clinging to the same clutch of buds as one of the Purples. We then ran into a gorgeous *valezina* **Silver-washed Fritillary**, which was subsequently pursued by a male – a truly lovely looking butterfly. White-letter Hairstreak would have been our hat-trick, but sadly the sun went in and that was pretty much it for butterflies and we weren't able to find one.

Our final destination for today was the fabulous Martin Down NNR. It was getting late in the day but we still saw scores of butterflies here amid a sea of chalkland plants in bloom, producing quite a spectacle. **Dark Green Fritillaries** were still going strong, and we saw huge numbers of Meadow Brown and Gatekeeper, **Marbled White** and best of all large numbers of **Chalkhill Blues**. Most of these were pristine males but we saw a few females too. A basking female **Adder** was a great bonus, and the **Frog Orchids** were in full bloom and easy to find in their usual spot here. We just generally enjoyed wandering around this fabulous site, noting **Lesser Whitethroat**, a lemon juvenile **Willow Warbler**, **Yellowhammer**, **Raven** and **Corn Bunting** in the process.

THURSDAY 5TH AUGUST – *Sunny spells then rain in the afternoon with fresh SW winds, 18C*

The forecast was not looking good for the second half of today, but with sunny spells to kick things off we hoped to find one or two damselflies at one of our favourite spots in the forest, before heading east to Titchfield Haven after lunch for some birding. Arriving at our first stop, we found

Beautiful Demoiselle and **Southern Damselfly** almost right away, which was a good sign. We managed superb views of both these species as we carefully worked our way along a small brook, checking sheltered clumps of bog myrtle where the damselflies were perched out of the wind. **Southern Damselfly** was quite common, but we also found several **Small Red Damselfly** too, and our first **Keeled Skimmer**. Up on the heath beyond, we had a look for **Dartford Warbler** in a regular spot and easily found a vocal female, that was ferrying food back and forth to concealed youngsters. She was very obliging, frequently perching on the tops of small clumps of heather before dropping in. Back to the van, we decided that we had time to squeeze another site in before the weather arrived, so headed on to Shatterford.



Southern Damselfly 5th August

It was very windy and exposed on the heath so sadly we couldn't find any Grayling butterflies, nor any Black Darters down by the boggy area. We did see a few Common Darters, the odd Keeled Skimmer, a female **Emperor** and lots of **Silver-studded Blue** butterflies. Bird wise it was quiet, but we did see four Raven 'cronking' overhead, and an adult Peregrine.

Titchfield Haven was our next destination, about a forty minute drive around to the other side of Southampton Water. It rained all the way there but had stopped again by the time we arrived, and we started by scoping the terns gathered at Hill Head on the high tide. Only Common Terns to be seen, but good numbers,, plus a small group of very smart **Turnstones** on the beach. The rain then returned, so we lunched in the van, before heading down to the Meon Shore Hide. From here we had close ups of **Black-tailed Godwits** and **Avocets**, a **Common Sandpiper**, and plenty of common ducks and gulls. Common Terns were again very prominent, with lots of fledged young still being fed by their parents. Walking round to pumfrett hide, we picked up a **Water Rail** along the edge of the reeds, and there were several colour-ringed birds among the Avocets, probably from a French scheme. A scaly juvenile **Mediterranean Gull** was also seen. The rain lashed down the whole time

we were here and showed no sign of letting up, so we headed back to base arriving back there around 5.30pm.

FRIDAY 6TH AUGUST – *Sunshine and strong SW winds, 19C*

The forecast today was a bit of a challenge, as it suggested that the coast might enjoy a fair bit of sunshine, but that more inland heavy cloud and showers would be more likely. Despite the strong winds, we therefore decided to head down to Portland hoping we would get enough sun and warmth out of the wind in the disused quarries, to look for in particular **Small Blue** but hopefully also with a chance for Adonis. This proved a good call, as we enjoyed pretty much wall to wall blue sky and sunshine there but could see north of Weymouth it was blanket cloud and rain showers! Our first stop was Broadcroft Quarry, and out of the wind it was a little micro climate of warmth bustling with butterflies. Common Blue was very numerous here, as were **Wall Brown** and Gatekeeper, but we also quickly found an immaculate and no doubt newly emerged **Small Blue**, our main target for the day. After photographing this beautiful butterfly we explored the quarry further, adding several **Chalkhill Blue**, a Small Skipper, **Lulworth Skipper** and Small Copper.

Tout Quarry was our next stop, and offered slightly different habitat being more open with more exposed rocks and shorter turf. This meant it was more exposed, but we did have the benefit of spectacular views north along Chesil Beach to Weymouth and beyond! **Chalkhill Blue** was on the wing in large numbers here, and we saw scores basking low in the grass trying to avoid the wind. We found another **Small Blue** here too, though much more worn and battered and presumably a late hanger-on from the first emergence. **Wall Brown**, **Lulworth Skipper**, Small Copper and Common Blue were all seen again and we also saw several **Grayling** which were common here. A great few hours bugging and despite no Adonis Blue, which doesn't quite yet seem to be on the wing, it had been worth the journey.

Lunch was taken down by The Fleet and a spot of birding yielded good numbers of Ringed Plovers, Dunlin, Turnstone and Sanderling on the mud there, plus the odd **Mediterranean Gull**. With the afternoon already well advanced, and the weather clouding over a bit, we decided that birding was probably the way to go for the remainder of the day so we headed to Lodmoor to see what we could find there. A good selection included fabulous close views of a barrage of **Mediterranean Gulls** in all plumages including scaly juveniles, plus we managed to read a couple of colour rings. Six **Common Sandpipers**, a handful of Dunlin and Black-tailed Godwits, Little Egret, **Marsh Harrier** and a few Common Terns were also seen here, plus a surprising three additions to the butterfly list – Comma, Speckled Wood and Holly Blue. A tough trip back to base through horrendous traffic, but all in all a good day.

SATURDAY 7TH AUGUST – *Sunny spells and strong winds, 18C*

Initially this morning was forecast to be pretty wet and overcast, but actually most of the rain had moved through by breakfast leaving a two hour window of sunny spells before the next wave of weather arrived. With this in mind, we headed to Acres Down to look for some woodland birds and raptors for a couple of hours, starting just around the car park. A mixed flock was moving here and we quickly found at least four **Fircerests** including two fledged juveniles, **Willow Warbler**, Nuthatch, Goldcrest, Coal Tit and others. Just up on the ridge behind, we found another corner with plenty of activity and two young **Redstarts** were flitting in and out of the holly and bracken along with more Willow Warblers. A **Holly Blue** was seen settled as we reached the viewpoint, and here the light was excellent for scanning over the forest for raptors. It was initially very quiet in the strong winds, but eventually a **Goshawk** emerged distantly and soared above the forest for a few minutes allowing scope views. Two **Hobby** showed better, cruising in overhead against a dark sky so that their white cheeks and red trousers were clearly visible.

Back at the van, we figured we probably had another hour before the rain arrived and so decided to try Matley Bog, a site which we had not yet had chance to visit. Several more **Redstarts** were seen here, plus a herd of Fallow Deer, as we wandered down onto the boggy heath. No Black Darters in the cool conditions, but we did find several **Emerald Damselfly**, a male Emperor, **Keeled Skimmer**, **Small Red Damselfly** and Common Darter. **Grayling** was also seen. Back up by the car park, we ended with a fantastic mixed flock comprised predominantly of **Willow Warblers**, with at least 40 seen including many lemon yellow juveniles. A superb male **Bullfinch** was also in the flock and

perched close to us, as well as Blackcap, Chiffchaff and a few common tits. From here we set off for home, doing battle with the M25 and getting back to Norfolk around 1830.
