



TOUR REPORT

Mull & Iona

22nd – 28th June 2026

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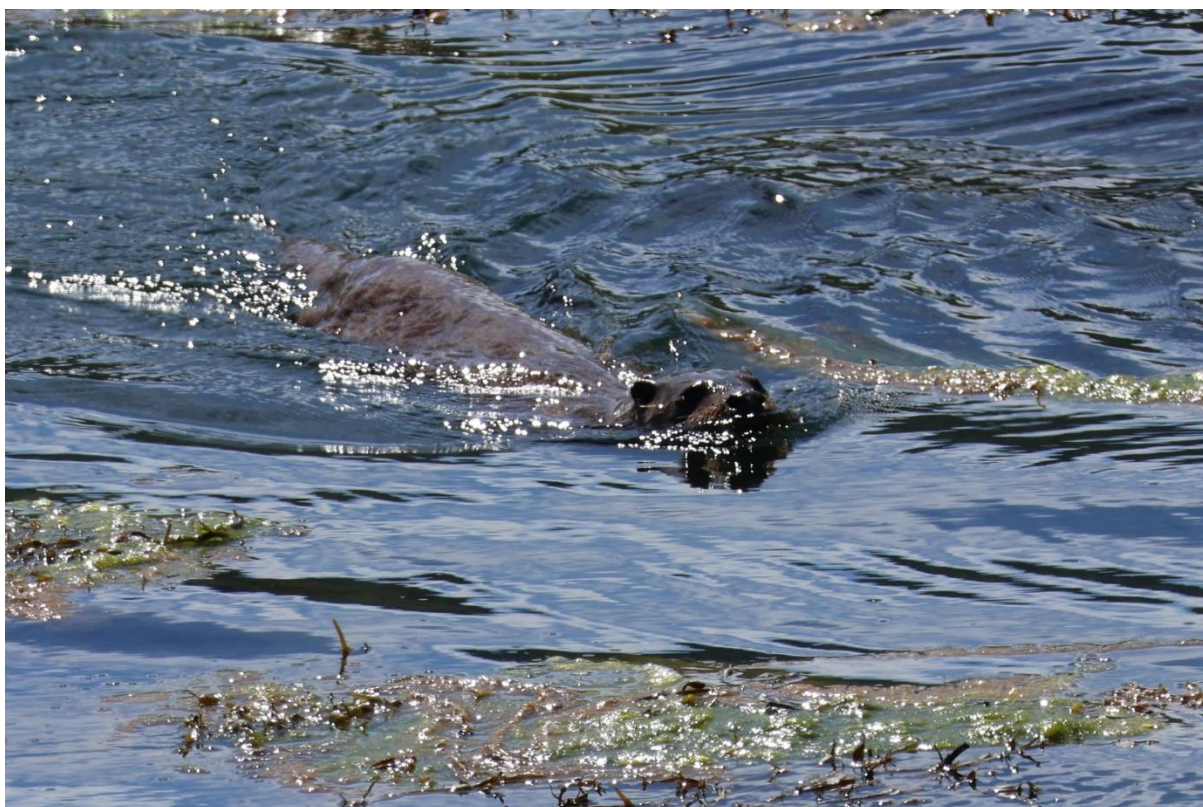
MONDAY 22ND JUNE – *Light rain clearing away to sunny spells and light winds. 23C*

A travelling day for us today as we set off from Lockerbie, having spent the night there last night. We made our way up around Glasgow and along the West side of Loch Lomond with no hold-ups, and reached our usual 'Green Welly Stop' in time to pick up sandwiches for lunch. We had a little time in the bank, and so made a detour to a favoured loch to eat lunch and have a scan about. We didn't see too much in the time available, but a **Grasshopper Warbler** was reeling in the bog myrtle close to our parking spot and gave extremely close views. A couple of Redpoll were about, lots of **Sand Martins** were over the water and we saw a **Greenshank** in the scope. From here we had about 1hr15m to reach Oban, which was now bathed in warm sunshine as we waited on the quayside for the ferry to Craignure. We saw our first **Black Guillemots** as we pulled out of Oban harbour, and enjoyed a silky smooth crossing along the Sound of Mull. A few other seabirds were noted such as **Common Guillemots**, **Shag** and a colony of **Common Terns**, plus the usual inquisitive **Harbour Seals**.

Reaching Mull, we began to make our way down the main drag towards Glen Forsa and on to the famous Three Lochs viewpoint, where we would pause for half an hour to scan the ridges for raptors. Rather than being greeted with the usual cold wind at this exposed spot, it was calm, muggy and 20C! Red Deer were dotted all along the ridge lines, no doubt heading higher to escape the unusual warmth. It didn't take long to spot our first **Golden Eagle** of the tour either, with an adult bird making a couple of brief appearances above the ridge top. Eventually it obliged by perching on the top of a crag right on the skyline, and with the light behind us we could see its golden nape and tawny wing patches. It then flew again, joined its mate and the two circled together before perching side by side! Excellent views, if typically a little distant, and a really good start! With a fair forecast, we anticipated many more eagle sightings to come – but you never know! From here it was a hop and a skip to the hotel where we checked in at 6pm.

TUESDAY 23RD JUNE – *Warm and sunny in light SW winds, 23C*

A stunning calm morning awaited us and Loch Scridain looked like plate glass as we gazed out across from the breakfast table. We would be treated to a rare day of warm weather on Mull and so we intended to try to make the most of it! Starting at Loch Beg, where the tide was low, we scanned for waders and picked up four smart **Golden Plover**, three **Greenshank** and a **Dunlin**. It was nice to see some **House Martins** busy at their nests under the eaves of the derelict hotel too. Continuing up the glen we drunk in the scenery on our way up to the turn off for Lochbuie, meandering through the lovely oak woods and down along the shoreline of Loch Spelve. Here we were in for our first **Otter** fix of the trip as a lone dog **Otter** was fishing close in along the shoreline. We were easily able to position the van as a mobile hide, moving along each time the animal dived so it remained oblivious to our presence. He came really close on a few occasions – Mull is a superb place for **Otter** watching but it's always a relief to see one so early in the trip! While we were scanning we then spotted a disturbance in the water much further out in the loch, and realised it was a group of cetaceans of some kind. We drove to a better spot to park and get out and identified the animals as **Common Dolphins**. Over the next 20 minutes we had good scope views of them as they moved up and down the centre of the loch clearly feeding.

We eventually reached the end of the road at Lochbuie and some of the group went in to have a coffee in The Old Post Office. For those of us who stayed outside, a bit of a surprise came as we heard the local Buzzards making a fuss and looked up to see them mobbing an eagle right above the café! Expecting a White-tailed at this low elevation, we were even more surprised to see it was a young **Golden Eagle** – and stunning views too! It was eventually escorted way off across the valley by a brace each of Buzzard and Hooded Crow! Retracing our route back along Loch Spelve we had another excellent **Otter** sighting – almost certainly the same animal having moved about a mile along the shore. Once we rejoined the main road, we turned towards Craignure and headed along to Inverlussa to have a scan around for **Hen Harrier**. We had superb close views of a male Redpoll and a pair of Siskins by our parking spot, and then watched a close Buzzard drift over. It always worth keeping an eye on the Buzzards, as any territorial harriers or owls in the vicinity will often come up to mob them. Sure enough a ‘grey ghost’ – a beautiful male **Hen Harrier** – cruised straight in and started bombing the Buzzard high above the road in front of us. Mull was giving up all its secrets early on this trip!

Back along the Glen then to a lovely picnic spot overlooking the valley. We didn’t see too much here but did hear a Tree Pipit sing briefly. Glen Forsa added a couple of nice orchids – **Heath Spotted**, **Northern Marsh** and **Heath Fragrant Orchids** all blooming along the roadside. From here we descended slowly down towards Loch Scridain and headed off now to check a **White-tailed Eagle** eyrie. On arrival we could see bits of the six week old chick in the nest but it was keeping low in the heat. Eventually it became quite vocal and sat right up in the nest to flap its wings a bit. Over the ridge behind, a small falcon appeared, cruising back and forth along the hillside. Amazingly it was a **Hobby** – a scarce bird in Mull and only our second ever here in over twenty years. The **Hobby** showed on and off for some time,

even perching in the top of some small trees up on the ridge, but always distant. Then the adult **White-tailed Eagle** came cruising in! The bird brought prey in to the nest and we were able to watch them feeding the chick, before it flew out and perched sentinel in a nearby conifer. Spectacular stuff!

WEDNESDAY 24TH JUNE – *Overcast and cool day with some light rain, 14C*

Today was our Sea Eagle Adventure boat trip with Mull charters which meant departing the hotel at 0815 and making the 1hr15m drive around via Craignure and Salen to Ulva Ferry. The winds were light and Loch Tuath looked calm, and as soon as we set out from the pontoon we ran into a mother and cub **Otter** fishing in the main channel. They seemed oblivious when us and another faster boat passed them but as soon as we cut the engine they smelt a rat, and slipped away into the seaweed. A couple of **Black Guillemots** were seen as we headed up along the east side of Ulva and out towards the seaward end of the loch. This was when our first **White-tailed Eagle** appeared – a male bird we had seen on many trips over the years, and known as ‘Compo’ after the fact he was a scruffy bird when first on the scene. Now he has smartened himself up and is a very experienced father of many chicks. With mouths to feed once again this year, he came twice to the boat over the next half hour to take a fish. His partner was much more wary and while she circled us several times, she didn’t come down.

Reaching the more open sea the weather closed in and the wind picked up, making for a cold and uncomfortable passage around the west end of Ulva, and it wasn’t until we reached calmer waters down the south side of the island that we were able to have a cup of tea and biscuits. A creche of **Common Eider** and several **Harbour Seals** were seen, plus lots of

Razorbills, a few **Guillemots** and the odd **Puffin**. Right at the end of our trip, we were treated to a surprise visit from a young **White-tailed Eagle** – maybe 3 years old. We saw the bird approach high from a great distance, showing what amazing eyesight these birds have. Even more so for this individual which seemed to have a damaged left eye, though that didn't stop it nabbing two fish with pin-point accuracy and flying up into nearby trees to feed. Young birds are far less regular visitors than the regular territorial birds, and this was a first for our trips here. A superb morning!

Lunch was had close to Eas Fors waterfall where a fledged young **Redpoll** was seen and a **Bullfinch** did a brief fly-by. On the narrow winding road around to Calgary, we had good views of **Wheatear** and a fine male **Yellowhammer** singing on a wire. Eventually we reached Dervaig, where we stopped to scan the bay – as usual lots of **Common Sandpipers** here, plus a pair of **Redshank** with a tiny newly-hatched chick. Overhead, another **White-tailed Eagle** soared, mobbed by a **Buzzard**, all much to the annoyance of the local Common Gulls. From here we took the road back down Glen Aros and enjoyed an impromptu roadside stop for a flowering **Greater Butterfly Orchid** – and absolute beauty! Everyone was pretty weary by now so we made our way slowly back down the glen to Pennyghael, pulling into the hotel at 5.30pm.

THURSDAY 25TH JUNE – *Overcast day with some sunny spells and light rain. 20C*

Something different for today as we were not going to visit the Treshnish Isles on this particular tour as most of the group were not physically able to make the landing. Instead, we arranged to join Sealife Mull on a four hour cetacean watching trip from Tobermory – which of course would also give us great opportunities for viewing seabirds. The trip took a

circular route out towards the island of Coll, passing just off its eastern end, before turning in a big arc out towards Rhum and back along the coast past Ardnamurchan Point. We started off in a glassy Sound of Mull enjoying point blank views of a pod of **Harbour Porpoise**, which spent a good while around the boat. Then heading further out we started to get in amongst the seabirds – particularly off the end of Coll where we saw thousands of **Manx Shearwaters**, many really close to the boat. **Guillemot**, **Razorbill**, **Kittiwake**, **Puffin** and **Arctic Tern** were also seen. Next up was a pod of **Common Dolphins**, which came in to bow ride the boat allowing for fantastic views! As we passed Rhum, another huge raft of **Manx Shearwaters** was seen and a single **European Storm-Petrel** flew close along the port side of the vessel. A **Great Skua** also gave a nice pass having been harassing the shearwaters further off. A second group of **Common Dolphins** were less obliging than the first and stayed just off. On our way back in, an adult **White-tailed Eagle** flew right over the boat before perching on the top of some tall spruce trees on the Mull shoreline. A great few hours on the water!

Everyone was very tired after a couple of long days so we had a short afternoon, heading to Knock and having a leisurely walk towards Loch Ba. **Goldcrest** was new for the trip and we had excellent prolonged scope views of a male **Crossbill** perched up. Down at the loch we noted **Red-breasted Merganser** and a very distant circling **Golden Eagle**. An adult **White-tailed Eagle** came closer, perching up on the side of the hill before circling over and heading away. We ended up back down in Pennyghael at 1645 ready for the heavy rain and thunderstorms to set in, which were forecast to be pretty mega around dinner time!

FRIDAY 26TH JUNE – *Overcast with light winds. Rain later. 16C*

After the overnight light show and torrential rain, we woke to a lovely calm morning with the loch once again looking like glass and the top of Ben More even being visible. We set off for Iona, heading down the Ross of Mull peninsula to Fionnphort where we took the short Calmac ferry crossing over to the island. The weather seemed to keep a lot of day trippers away today and it was probably the quietest we had ever seen it. Whether that had a direct impact on the fact we heard more **Corncrakes** than we have for several years is a bit of an unknown! One bird was calling behind the fire station, with another further up the hill behind, and three individuals in the meadows between the St Colomba hotel and the famous Iona Abbey. With the lush vegetation mainly at waist height, we didn't have much chance of a sighting, but it was great to hear birds creaking almost the entire time we were on the island. A few other bits and pieces were noted such as **Sedge Warbler** and **Rock Dove**, but due to the limited mobility of the group we didn't stray too far from the village this year. After lunch overlooking the work-in-progress new marina, we took the ferry back over about 1.45pm.

This afternoon we headed back up the peninsula and past the hotel, with our next stop being at Loch Beg on the flowing tide. At least eight **Greenshank** were here, plus several **Curlew**, a **Ringed Plover** and the usual other local birds. Driving around the far side, we scanned the shoreline for Otters as the now light drizzle and rising tide looked ideal, but we weren't lucky with a sighting. A **Common Snipe** showed brilliantly on a roadside gatepost though and there were also nice views of **Reed Bunting** and **Common Sandpiper**, plus more distant **Stonechat** and **Red-breasted Merganser**. We checked in again on the **White-tailed Eagle** nest, and the chick was more active today standing right up in the nest and flapping its

wings. One of the adults cruised in just as we headed off, as the rain started to worsen. The visibility had now closed right in and our target of more Hen Harrier views would now have to wait until tomorrow.

SATURDAY 27TH JUNE – *Overcast day with some light rain, 17C*

A 'mopping up' day for us today with Hen Harrier being a particular target – it seemed a rather poor year for them on the island this year and we had only seen one male so far. An **Otter** kicked things off for us though, putting on a great show right outside the hotel. Heading up the glen low cloud was hanging over all the surrounding hills and spots of rain were hitting the windscreen but as we dropped down past the three lochs we came down out of the cloud and the weather was much better. Inverlussa was the spot we had seen our previous **Hen Harrier** and it didn't take too long to see it again, with the male bird cruising across the hillside quite distantly. More of a surprise though was an **Osprey** which approached from the north carrying a huge fish, across the road in front of us and off towards Loch Spelve. **Willow Warbler**, **Redpoll** and **Reed Bunting** were also seen and a little further along the road a superb male **Whinchat** was seen along a fenceline.

Next we took the turning to Grasspoint, parking at the road end and walking on down towards the house at the point. More small birds were seen including another smashing male **Redpoll**, but otherwise it was fairly quiet here. We did however have excellent views of a ringtail **Hen Harrier** in the same spot both on our way in and out of the valley, giving point blank views next to the road. Just north of Craignure we stopped for lunch and then scanned the shore and stony islands where we had good views of several **Arctic Terns** which were

nesting on the shingle. A large party of **Common Terns** were also present, plus a moulting group of **Red-breasted Mergansers**, a single female **Eider** and a small group of **Turnstones**.

We then took a circuitous route north to Salen and on around past Knock towards Gribun and back along Glen Seilisdeir. A few roadside birds included an unexpected **Goosander**, lots of **Wheatears**, **Rock Pipit**, **Ringed Plover** and **Common Sandpiper**. We checked in on the **White-tailed Eagle** chick again, which today was sitting right up in the nest looking at us – no sign of the adults today though. We circled back through Kinloch with one more highlight in store as a lovely **Spotted Flycatcher** was on a fence next to the road and remained long enough for us to park up and get out for a better look. Everyone was extremely tired by now so we took an 'early bath' to rest and do packing ready for the long trip home tomorrow.

SUNDAY 28TH JUNE – *Sunny spells and light winds, 22C*

A day of travel today as we departed Mull on the 0930 ferry, making for Carlisle where we arrived at 4pm.
